## NH Amateur Chess Championship

Nashua - November 15, 2014
The 39th NH Amateur Championship drew a near-record 81 players to the Nashua Holiday Inn on November 15, 2014. In the top section, Stijn Brand of Concord, NH finished 4-0 to take clear first and win the NH Amateur Champion title. In the Intermediate section (under 1750), there was a three-way tie for first at $3.5-0.5$ between Mike Commisso of Brookline, NH, David Hoyt of Haverhill, MA and Pascal Bakker of Enfield, NH. Finally, in the Novice section (under 1300) Rafael Perez of Manchester, NH won clear first with a 4-0 score. Two other players finished undefeated at 3.5-0.5, Alan Siller of Concord, NH and Arjun Rajan of Exeter, NH. Hal Terrie directed for the NHCA.

## 1.d4 Nf6 2.Bf4 g6 3.Nf3 Bg7 4.e3 d5 5.Nbd2 0-0 6.Be2

If White plays the more active $6 . \mathrm{Bd} 3$ (hoping to achieve the move e4), Black can play 6...c5 7.c3 b6 8.0-0 Bb7 9.Qe2 and now 9 ...Ne4! (just in time!) frustrates his intentions. 10.Rfe1 Nd7 when Black has no problems.

## 6...c5 7.c3 cxd4

This is not really a bad move but I don't like it, as it opens the e-file for White, adding to his potential control of the e5 square. I think it is better for Black to maintain the tension. (I would prefer something like this: 7...b6 8.Ne5 Bb7 9.0-0 and now 9...Nfd7! 10.Ndf3 Nc6)

## 8.exd4 Nc6 9.Ne5

Or 9.0-0 Bf5 10.a4 a6 11.h3 Ne4 12.Re1 Rc8 when Black had complete equality in Shimanov,A (2549) Nepomniachtchi,I (2730) Warsaw 2011.

## 9...Nd7 10.Nxd7 Qxd7

$10 \ldots$ Bxd7 is quite playable. If White tries to "take advantage" of this move by $11 . \mathrm{Qb} 3$ Black gets very active play:
11...e5 12.dxe5 Bxe5 13.Bxe5 Nxe5 and now: The safest move is $14.0-0$ but after $14 \ldots$ Bc6 Black is doing fine.
a) The ambitious $14 . \mathrm{Qxd} 5$ is met by $14 \ldots \operatorname{Re} 815.0-0 \mathrm{Bg} 416 . \mathrm{Qxd} 8$ Rexd8! (The best recapture as now Bb 5 does not attack a rook.) 17.Nb3 (Black also regains the pawn with a fine game after 17.Bxg4 Rxd2) 17...Bxe2 18.Rfe1 Nf3+ 19.gxf3 Bxf3
b) Not 14.Qxb7? Bg4 15.f3 (15.Bxg4 Nxg4 16.0-0 runs into $16 \ldots . \mathrm{Qd} 617 . g 3 \mathrm{Rfb} 8$ when the White queen is trapped.) 15...Bf5 16.0-0 Rb8 17.Qxa7 Rxb2 18.Rad1 Re8 when Black has tremendous piece activity for the pawn.

## 11.0-0 36

A more active way to play is 11 ...f6 planning to follow with ...e5. Black wants to avoid getting stuck with a static pawn structure with all his pawns on light squares. Now after 12.Nb3 e5 13.dxe5 fxe5 14.Bg3 Qf7 15.Bf3 e4 16.Be2 Bf5 17.Qd2 Rad8 Black was doing fine in the game Pedersen, J (2331)-Rasmussen, A (2253) Nyborg 2001.

## 12.Nf3 b5 13.Re1 Bb7 14.Qd2 e6

Black could still play for ...f6 and ...e5 here. For example 14...f6 15.Rad1 e5 16.dxe5 fxe5 17.Bg3 Rad8

## 15.Bf1 Qe7 16.Ne5 Nxe5 17.Bxe5 Bxe5 18.Rxe5 Bc6 19.Rae1 a5 20.R1e3 b4 21.Rh3

Black is still OK but he needs to be very careful.

## 21...Ra7 22.Bd3 f5?

This is a tactical error which loses a pawn but it would also be a serious strategic mistake in any case, giving White permanent control of the e5 square. Instead, after 22...bxc3 23.bxc3 and now 23...f6! (That move again!) 24.Re1 e5 Black strikes back in the center and regains some dark-square control.

## 23.Rhe3 bxc3 24.Qxc3 Bd7 25.Rxd5

White doesn't play it in the most accurate way after this but he makes steady progress and soon brings home the point.

## Scholastic Individual Championships

Exeter - March 28, 2015
The 2015 New Hampshire Scholastic Individual Championships were held on Saturday, March 28, 2015 at Phillips Exeter Academy. 68 players attended.

The primary section (grades K-3) only drew three players, so the primary section was merged with the elementary section (grades 4-6). This did not phase 3rd-grade student Meghana Kancharla, however, who managed 3.5/4.0 and won the primary section despite having to compete with older competition. This marks the second year in a row that Meghana has won the primary section, doing so with a combined record of 7.5/8.0.

Meghana's $3.5 / 4.0$ in the merged section was only bested by 5th-grader Abhinav Govindaraju, whose final round win in a very competitive game with 6th grader and former elementary section winner Finn Garside completed his perfect afternoon, making him the only player of the section's 23 competitors to manage a perfect score.

15 players competed in the junior high section, with 8th-grader Robert Sawdey, the section's highest-rated player, proving the bigger they are, the more rarely they fall. Robert scored a perfect $4.0 / 4.0$, including a nice technical endgame conversion against 7th-grader Ananth Rangan in the final round to win the event.

The largest and most competitive section proved to be the 31-player high school section. The host school, Phillips Exeter, came ready to compete, and when the final round was set, two Phillips Exeter students, 11th-grader Mandy Lu and 12th-grader Ellen Xiang, competed for the section's honors. In a nerve-wracking contest, Ellen achieved a winning position but lost the thread in time pressure, allowing Mandy to escape her predicament and win the game. This was Mandy's second consecutive perfect score

For winning the junior high section, Robert Sawdey has the right to represent New Hampshire at the Barber Tournament of K-8 Champions. Similarly, Mandy Lu may, for a second time, defend New Hampshire's honor at the Denker Tournament of High School Champions.

Additionally, 10th-grader Evan Xiang, whose 3.5/4.0 made her the top finishing female player aside from Mandy Lu, earned the right to represent New Hampshire at the National Girls Invitational Tournament (NGIT). The Denker, Barber and NGIT tournaments will all be run alongside the US Open this summer in Arizona.

The NHCA would like to extend its congratulations to these players and its thanks to all the players, parents and coaches who made the event a success. Additionally, the NHCA would like to thank Phillips Exeter Academy, including both its staff and the representatives of its chess club, for hosting the event. In particular, the NHCA would like to recognize the efforts of Ellen Xiang, without whom the staging of the event at Phillips Exeter would not have been possible.
