# Queen City Tornado <br> Manchester - March 4, 2017 

The 2017 Queen City Tornado, a Game in 60 event held in Manchester, NH on March 4 ${ }^{\text {th }}$, saw a clear winner in the Open section as Jerry Li of Massachusetts swept the field with a 4-0 result. Second place was shared, at 3 out of 4, by Christopher Wood, John Elmore, and Eric Feng. In the U1800 section, Michael Meehan, Pascal Bakker, and Sai Sneha Yerra all scored 3.5 out of 4 to crowd the podium. The U1400 saw another clean sweep as Andre Bakker took top honors, while Ranjan Dey, Ansh Yadawad, and John Curl-Larson all tied for second with 3 out of 4.

With the score-keeping requirement waived due the rapid time control, this event doesn't result in a lot of games for us to replay. Luckily, our tournament winner, John Elmore, armed with his trusty Monroi, opted to record his path to victory. Not only that, he kindly offered to annotate every round along the way. We present here his notes, plus one of our own: John's first place marks his fourth in this event, breaking the previous record of three Quick Chess titles held by Braden Bournival.

White, having weakened her queenside dark squares, fails to notice a nasty pin on her c3 knight.
